Course Overview: An introduction to the fundamentals of immunology, especially as they relate to human diseases. Topics include history of immunology, basic elements of immune systems, principles of natural and acquired immunity, cellular and molecular basis of B cell and T cell development and diversity, and clinical aspects of immunology. Prerequisites: CHY 107 or CHY 115, junior standing, and grade of C- or higher in either BIO 107 or BIO 113; or permission of instructor. 3 Credit Hours.

Main Course Goals and Objectives:

- Understand the role(s) of the innate immune system in allowing for a functional adaptive immune system response to infection.
- Understand the role(s) of the adaptive immune system in allowing for a functional response to infection
- Understand the role of the adaptive immune system in memory development against pathogens
- Understand the role of immunoglobulins in the innate and adaptive immune response
- Understand the current vaccine platforms available to help fight infectious disease
