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## Course Objectives

This course is designed to give you an understanding of the diversity, structure, and function of human parasites.

### Text

Foundations of Parasitology, by Larry Roberts and John Janovy, Jr. and Steve Nadler, **9**<sup>th</sup> edition, 2018 (ISBN: 9780073524191). The textbook is strongly recommended and readings will be assigned.

### **Blackboard**

Blackboard will be used as our course website. I will post the syllabus, handouts, announcements, lecture slides, supplemental reading, exam grades, etc. It is your responsibility to check this website regularly and locate information for classes that you may have missed.

### Attendance policy

You should attend all lectures. I may cover additional material not in the textbook, so you will miss information if you do not attend class. Any additional material we cover in class or that I provide on Blackboard may be included in the exams.

#### Inclement weather

## <u>Exams</u>

There will be two exams including the final exam, each including both multiple-choice and short answer questions. The final exam will be worth the highest percentage of your grade. (Exam 1 = 20%, Exam 2 = 40%)

Make a note of the exam dates because make-up exams will only be offered in cases where extreme, justifiable excuses can be provided. You must contact me before or during the exam to have the option for a make-up exam. If you fail to get in touch with me before or during the exam, then you may **NOT take a make-up exam**.

Past students have found it very useful to study by drawing, teaching each other, making concept maps, and other creative methods. Simply making flashcards and/or reading the book/notes is may not be the best way to study for this class for you! I am more than happy to meet with you to guide you towards the best study techniques.

## <u>Quizzes</u>

There will be three quizzes, each given at the beginning of class on the dates noted in the schedule below. Each quiz will cover material we have discussed since the previous quiz or exam. These are designed to help you stay on top of the material and to assess your level of understanding between exams.

Make every effort to be in class on these days to take the quizzes. If there is a justifiable reason why you will miss a quiz, then you must let me know either before or during (via email) the quiz in order to have the option to take a make-up quiz. If you fail to get in touch with me either before or during the quiz, then you may NOT take a make-up quiz.

### Mini review project

You will choose one parasite and write a mini-review article on a specific aspect of the parasite (biology, therapeutics). For this assignment you will survey several recent primary journal articles pertaining to the human parasitic disease you chose. After your research, you will summarize those articles in regards to the current understanding of that topic for the parasite you chose. More specific details will be provided.

### Classroom citizenship
