Course Description, including format:

This course is aimed at biology undergraduates and graduate students and is designed to be a deep dive into the interactions between microbes and their environments/communities.

Learning Outcomes:

The objectives you should establish for yourself for this class include (but are not limited to):

- To learn about microbes in their natural environments
- ❖ To learn about techniques used to investigate microbial ecology
- ❖ To learn to read and critique research studies

Assessments:

Exams

There will be <u>two exams</u>, each consisting of both multiple-choice and short answer questions. **Exams will be in person on campus unless USM halts in-person meetings**. The final exam is not technically cumulative, but I will expect you to apply knowledge from throughout the course to the later material. Questions may include short-answer or essay questions. Make a note of these dates because make-up exams will only be given if you have an extreme and dire emergency.

Past students have found it very useful to study by drawing, teaching each other, making concept maps, and other creative methods. Simply making flashcards and/or passively reading the book/notes is **NOT** the best way to study for this class! Talk with me or the LAs to discuss the best study techniques.

Focus project:

Throughout the semester, you will explore a topic of your choice related to how microbes influence and interact with their environment. This semester-long project will culminate in a research paper and a short slide presentation. Detailed instructions will be provided.

Scores on assignments that are turned in late will be lowered by 10% per day for each day (24 hours) beyond the due date. However, you have <u>four floating "grace days"</u> (a <u>total</u> of four days for the semester) that you may use as needed to avoid a penalty (this does not include the presentation). For example, you may use all four grace days to extend the first due date without penalty, but then the remaining assignments must be on time; or you may use two grace days for one assignment and two for another. How (or if) you use these is up to you, but the goal is to give you a little bit of flexibility with due dates. Because you have this flexibility, <u>no other late excuses</u> (with the exception of those most extreme and dire) will be accepted.

<u>Assignments/ Discussions</u>: These may include group work, debates, questions for our class guest (if we can lure in a guest!), etc. Detailed instructions for each assignment will be shared in advance.

Paper Discussions:

Several times throughout the semester we will dive deeply into papers from the scientific literature. You (with a partner) will be responsible for leading the discussion which means

you guide the class through the paper. Everyone is expected to come to class prepared for each and every one of these discussions, which means careful reading of the paper and answering assigned questions. Part of your score will be based on your preparation as a leader and part will be based on your participation when others are the leader.

Communications and Citizenship

I make every effort to respond to emails in a timely manner but please be mindful that I am not available 24/7. I treat you with respect in class and via email and expect respect in return. In general, email is the best way for us to communicate with each other so it is important that you check your email and keep up with Brightspace routinely.

<u>Classroom etiquette</u>: The same level of professional etiquette is important both in the physical classroom and in the online environment. Following these simple rules will ensure a constructive learning environment for all of us:

- * Respect the classroom environment (whether in person or online) and never forward in-class communications or posts by people in this class to others outside this class.
- ❖ Refrain from inappropriate language and derogatory or personal attacks
- ❖ Do not dominate any discussion. Give other students the opportunity to join in the discussion
- You may disagree with ideas, but avoid statements that may be interpreted as a personal attack
