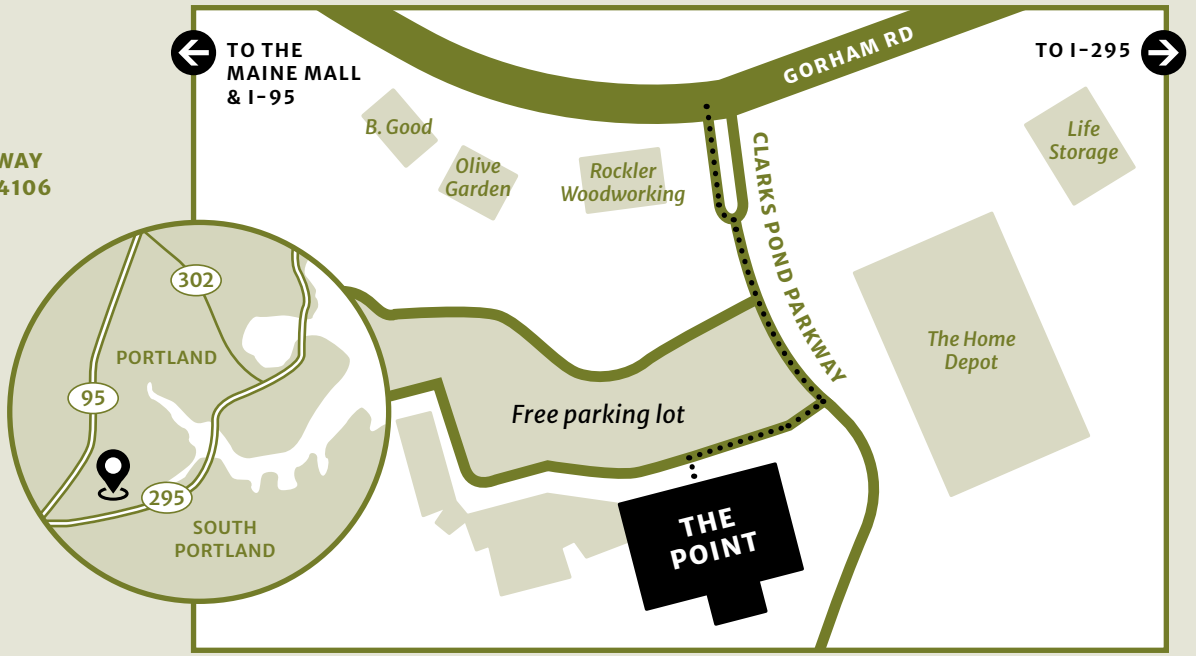

"Have We a Slaver in Portland Harbor?": Maine & the Global Slave Trade, 1840–1865

Maine-built, registered, and captained vessels transported at least 20,000 enslaved Africans to Cuba between 1850 and 1862 alone. McMahon will explore Maine's economic complicity in the slave trade and how it depended upon global slavery.
