1. Course Information

Course Description:

Accounting is the language of business which communicates information about the business performance through financial statements. Yet, only when you understand the nature of data, you can use the data to evaluate and communicate the information. *Financial Reporting I* is an in-depth study of accounting concepts and principles and builds on the knowledge you obtained in your introductory financial accounting course (Prerequisites: ACC 110 or equivalent).

The accounting rules and regulations change over time and those who are better at adapting to those changes will thrive in this profession. After completing this course, you will acquire technical competencies to identify and apply appropriate accounting measurements and possess a strong understanding of conceptual underpinnings of accounting procedure.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon the completion of this course, you will be able to:

- i. Understand the sources of generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP") and the assumptions and conventions that influence GAAP (including those political, legal and social influences).
- ii. Develop a conceptual and substantive understanding of GAAP as they apply to the asset side of the balance sheet.
- iii. Understand the purposes and elements of all the following financial statements: Balance Sheet,

Income Statement, and Cash Flow Statement.

- iv. Gain an awareness of the ethical issues that arise in financial reporting practices and the dilemmas that one may encounter in presenting financial statements fairly.
- v. Develop more sophisticated analytical and critical thinking skills by confronting unstructured problems with more than one defensible solution.
